The Events is a daring theatrical event that explores our desire to fathom the unfathomable and asks how far forgiveness will stretch in the face of atrocity.

From the Pastor: English worship services at Mindekirken

Mindekirken is a Norwegian-speaking congregation with a long and proud history. The congregation was formed in 1922 when other Norwegian American congregations in our area were becoming more integrated in American culture and beginning to switch over to English as their main language. The stated purpose for Mindekirken was to secure that one congregation in the Twin Cities continue to provide regular Norwegian language worship services as long as people are interested in attending such services.

The Norwegian language worship service has been the main reason why people have been coming to Mindekirken over the years. But Rev. Ivar Aus (1959-71) conducted some services in English and Rev. Harry Cleven (1973-79) formally added a 9 a.m. English service during his tenure.

Upon arriving at Mindekirken in 2009, I inherited a worship schedule with a 9 a.m. English service and an 11 a.m. Norwegian service most Sundays except the last Sunday of the month when a bilingual service was held at 11 a.m. This service uses a simplified Norwegian Family Liturgy and the sermon is given in English. The thought behind such a worship service was to bring the entire worshipping congregation together once each month. Initially this was supported by potluck suppers and educational opportunities. But this schedule has not fully worked in my time as most people have a strong affinity to either the

9 a.m. English service or the 11 a.m. Norwegian service. Some people are not interested in attending a different type of service or to worship at a different time. It has also proven hard for people to keep track of which Sundays the 9 a.m. English service is held. Often people arrive at the church for a 9 a.m. English service on a Sunday without such a service, and this is not very helpful for the people who make an effort to come or for the church.

The English worship service is currently attended by a small number of people. Several people who used to attend this service have moved away, are no longer able to attend regularly or have passed away. A numerical growth has proven difficult perhaps because of the lack of a consistent service every Sunday. This has led me to propose to the Congregation Council that we start having a 9 a.m. English worship service every Sunday throughout the year except on rare special Sundays. This will take effect on Sunday, October 25.

Such a change may prove to be a helpful time to talk about what we would like our 9 a.m. English worship service to be. The liturgy used for the English service has changed over time. But unfortunately not much of this history has been documented in minutes and reports. However, we do know that an English translation of the Norwegian liturgy was used when Rev. Torgeir Havgar (1992) was the interim pastor. We are currently using Setting 2 in the Lutheran Book of Worship (LBW - green hymnal).

I am interested in comments and suggestions from you who attend the early service. How can we do a better job supporting you on your faith journey and also attract new people to attend this early service? What kind of liturgy is the "right" liturgy for our setting? It also would be helpful to know what people in general think about the monthly bilingual worship service. If we are going to do an English service every Sunday, does this take away the need for this monthly bilingual service? Would it be better to do a Norwegian service those Sundays as well? The Board of Deacons and I are looking forward to hearing your comments and suggestions.

Oct. 6: Rune Alver — Norwegian Pianist A Concert Preview (L.E.I.F. Festival)

Rune Alver is distinguished by his focus on the compositions of Edvard Grieg. He has recorded two albums of Grieg's work: one on the composer's own 1892 Steinway grand piano, and the other at the new concert hall at the Edvard Grieg Museum, Troidhaugen, in Bergen, Norway.

Rune Alver was born in Bergen, Norway. His program will include Grieg, but also Norwegian composers like Tveitt & Sæverud who endured the German occupation of Norway during WWII. Rune Alver will share their stories with us. Mr. Alver will present a feature concert at Mindekirken on Fri., Oct. 9 at 7:30 p.m.



Oct. 27: Jan Smith — Life with Trolls

Jan Smith is a trollologist who tells stories about *Tusseladder*, *Hulder* and other miscellaneous trolls and will also explain why life at your house is sometimes in an uproar.



Storytelling has always been an important part of Jan's life. In her early childhood, her father used to tell fairytales and Norse myths when the family

Oct. 13: John Yilek — A History of Norway







Dear Members and Friends
of Mindekirken,

Mindekirken's ministry is unique because the founding members saw a need for Ministry for Jesus Christ to people primarily in Norwegian vs. English.

"Who Do You Think You Are? (U.S. TV series now on TPT) In each episode, a different celebrity goes on a journey to trace parts of his or her family tree. We do not need to be a celebrity to want to know who was in our family tree. America is supposed to be a melting pot of people from all around the world. I claim that if we are to have respect for our neighbors from different lands, we must understand our own background: where our families came from and what were their religious upbringings. Know it or not, I think this has shaped who we have become. This is also the mes-



sage that many of the celebrities repeat many times in each episode.

For the next three months, fund raising activities will be in full swing. Last year, the Treasurer Chest Event, Rømmegrøt Luncheons, and Lutefisk Dinner contributed \$27,404 or 10% of the income to the General Fund budget. Please support these events with purchases and volunteering.

Since 2008, we have been running at a deficit of over \$25,000 each year. Last year our deficit was \$34,816 or 13% of the income to the General Fund budget.
